With over 100 years of tradition and history, the Ritsumeikan Academy opened Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University (APU) in April 2000 as Japan's first genuinely international university. Our graduate schools welcome students into a fully English-based curriculum within a uniquely multicultural environment. APU's Graduate Schools are fully accredited by the Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT).

Since the opening of APU's Graduate Schools, efforts have been made to further its education and research initiatives and expand its contribution to the Asia Pacific region. The Graduate Schools at APU focus on Asia Pacific studies, with study options geared towards tackling the complex issues facing the societies and environments of the Asia Pacific region, as well as management, with a focus on the Japanese business style and the dynamic world of international business.

A TRULY INTERNATIONAL ENVIRONMENT

APU's campus is a unique doorway to the world, attracting students and faculty from all over the globe. Our Japanese faculty members also come to us with diverse international careers and academic experiences. This extremely rich mixture of language and culture has earned APU the reputation of being Japan's 'global village'. Our aim is to bring together talented individuals to study and live within this unique environment. APU encourages all students to bring and share their own unique thoughts and ideas. In this one of a kind environment, students naturally acquire intercultural communication skills.

As APU's graduate programs are offered entirely in English, students are not required to know any Japanese to gain admission. English speaking students come to APU and study their degree in English, are taught by international professors and lecturers, and study alongside English speaking classmates from around the world. Our system has made it possible for outstanding scholars to study in Japan in an unprecedented international learning environment.

WORLD CLASS EDUCATION

APU's graduate programs have been selected for several prestigious scholarship schemes in recent years. These include the Joint Japan/World Bank Graduate Scholarship Program and the Asian Development Bank - Japan Scholarship Program, which provide support for students from member countries to undertake graduate studies at renowned institutions of higher education around the world. APU is also among the very few institutions to be selected by the Japanese government for scholarships such as the Student Priority Placement Program. Some of the other organizations which have sponsored students to study in our graduate programs include the Indonesian Ministry of Finance, Japanese corporations, local government bodies, and the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA). This is a testimony to the value placed on APU's graduate programs by both public and private sectors in Japan and throughout the world.

THE JAPANESE EXPERIENCE

Japan has a long and rich history and is a diverse cultural mix of East and West, old and new, and natural and highly engineered. Having gone through various stages of development, the nation's rich and unique culture is what led it to emerge as a world leader in terms of economy and technology. MASTER'S PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Asia Pacific Studies (APS)

The Master's program in Asia Pacific Studies aims to educate and transform students into competent leaders ready to handle challenges facing the Asia Pacific region. The program encourages students to analyze complicated and ever-changing sociocultural conditions and international issues, pursue feasible solutions and pave a path to a prosperous future for the region. Students accumulate professional knowledge and insights, interpret complex facts in objective and systematic manners and provide insightful solutions to problems.

A broad range of issues are addressed in the two divisions: International Relations and Society and Culture. The courses taught under this program consist of four pillars: analytical foundation courses, core courses on the Asia Pacific region, division-specific courses and research-oriented intensive seminar courses. This program nurtures students' research skills, including the ability to formulate frameworks for analyses, collect and analyze data, and test arguments and hypotheses. Students are expected to conduct research under a specific theme in a systematic manner throughout their studies.

At the end of the program, students must submit a thesis or report on a theme of their choice, which they have developed under personal guidance from their supervisors in the seminar courses run throughout the program. During the process, they are encouraged to conduct field surveys in the Asia Pacific region.

International Cooperation Policy (ICP)

The master's program in International Cooperation Policy provides students with policy-oriented and practical advice, drawing on diverse fields to train creative professionals who can understand complex challenges from multiple perspectives and formulate feasible solutions with integrative approaches from global, regional, and local perspectives. Such training will improve practical skills and knowledge to plan, implement and evaluate projects, and thereby contribute to organizations that work closely with and in developing nations.

Students can select one of the following five divisions for their specialization: International Public Administration, Public Health Management, Sustainability Science, Tourism and Hospitality and Development Economics. They are required to take analytical foundation courses, core courses on the Asia Pacific region, division-specific courses and research-oriented seminar courses.

Additionally, numerous seminars and workshops are organized throughout the year. There are many opportunities for students to participate in the exchange of ideas, information and expertise with academics, experts, business executives, policy makers, and senior administrators. Students must submit a master's thesis or research report in order to complete their degree.

Given the scarcity of healthcare resources, there is an urgent need to optimize their management. This is to ensure that healthcare disbursements reach their intended target, especially when it concerns the most vulnerable segments of the population. In addition, with rapidly aging populations, the anticipated cost of healthcare is burgeoning. This calls for many innovative designs and partnerships in order to deliver the services required in a sustained manner and at optimal cost.

The principal aim of the PHM division is to develop graduates who can contribute to innovation and development at local, national and international levels in the field of public health management. The division combines education, research and practice, and is likely to be of interest to medical professionals, health administrators, representatives from civil society organizations engaged in public health and others allied with the medical field.

DIVISION OVERVIEW

The **Public Health Management (PHM)** division teaches students three fundamental skills: skills in managing the budget, finance, economics and accounting of healthcare costs; skills in epidemiology, health statistics and research methodology as well as information management; and skills in public health, mainly preventive medicine and environmental health. This division puts emphasis on the economics and financial as well as administrative management of healthcare services at both the public and private sectors, while preserving the standard foundations of conventional public health education. Moreover, it encourages students at an early stage to focus on healthcare case studies that relate to significant issues in the Asia Pacific region. They may start by reviewing current health issues as reflected in papers, and by raising research questions with policy implications from the very beginning. This aspect of teaching and research is looked upon as a strategic approach throughout the whole length of the program.

The **Sustainability Science (SS)** division focuses on the application of science for achieving the goals of sustainable development. This division analyzes the planning and implementation of policies and actions that deal with the relationship between society and nature with the ultimate goal to create a sustainable future for all. Study involves the scientific understanding of society-nature interactions; linking research with policy and actions; generating new knowledge, tools and techniques; and enhancing scientific and institutional capability for promoting sustainability and resilience. Students are expected to gain a holistic perspective, integrative skills and interdisciplinary knowledge as they engage in analyzing and managing particular problems and issues of population-resource-technology-institution interactions.

INTERNATIONAL MATERIAL FLOW MANAGEMENT (IMAT)

DUAL DEGREE WITH TRIER UNIVERSITY OF APPLIED SCIENCES, GERMANY

The Master in International Material Flow Management (IMAT) program is APU's flagship dual master degree program with the Trier University of Applied Sciences, conducted by the Institute for Applied Material Flow Management (IfaS) in Germany. Students of IMAT get the opportunity to study at APU in Beppu, Japan, the birthplace of the One Village One Product (OVOP) movement, in their first year and at the Environmental Campus Birkenfeld (ECB), the first Zero Emission (ZE) campus in Europe, in their second year. Upon graduating from each university, the students earn a Master of Science in International Cooperation Policy from APU and a Master of Engineering from Trier University of Applied Sciences. In addition, students enrolled in Sustainability Science who meet the criteria also have the opportunity to transfer to the IMAT Program after enrollment.

Among a raft of unique opportunities, IMAT provides a platform for its students to study, explore, and hone their skills on practical solutions for zero emission and circular economy. The program encourages students to work on projects and apply problem-oriented and trans-disciplinary approaches to the application of knowledge, science and/or management principles. Celebrating a decade of APU-IfaS cooperation, IMAT has produced over 90 International Material Flow Managers to date.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

IMAT is a dual-degree program managed jointly by APU and the Institute of Applied Material Flow Management (IfaS), an innovative research institute of the Trier University of Applied Sciences (Germany). Students will spend their first year studying at APU and the second year at the Zero-Emission Campus Birkenfeld in Germany.

The program offers integrated knowledge in engineering, economics, law and natural and social sciences. In addition to the learning goals of the Sustainability Science division, IMAT offers multidisciplinary courses to prepare students to become young professionals in zero emission systems design with profound knowledge in renewable energy, integrated water resource management and other sustainable community development areas. Students will also have the opportunity to conduct field work in Japan and participate in an internship in Germany. IMAT students will have to submit a master's thesis to IfaS in Germany. A concise summary of this thesis is to be submitted to APU in the form of a research report. Upon completion of the program, students receive two master's degrees, a Master of Science in International Cooperation Policy (from APU) and a Master of Engineering in International Material Flow Management (from Trier University of Applied Sciences).


DEVELOPMENT ECONOMICS (DE)

DOCTORAL PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The developing world is in great need of internationally minded individuals possessing specialized knowledge and skills. Therefore, it is becoming increasingly common for international aid organizations to enlist the professional guidance of doctoral graduates. The same holds true for local organizations that receive and coordinate aid. This doctoral program helps students to realize their potential in order to make significant contributions to society.

The doctoral program aims to produce independent individuals capable of conducting high-level research. This involves gaining expertise in theoretical and empirical approaches for investigation, acquiring in-depth knowledge of the Asia Pacific region, collecting and analyzing data and drawing practical solutions for complicated issues in a comprehensive and integrative manner. Alumni of this program become distinguished leaders and take on prominent roles in advanced institutions for research and higher education around the world.

This program's research is divided into two broad areas of study:

- I. Understanding the current situation in the Asia Pacific region: Research examines and defines critical issues currently facing the region by synthesizing the results of previous studies.
- II. Working to create a prosperous future for the Asia Pacific region: Future-oriented research focuses on strategies for establishing sustainable development in the region.

COURSE STRUCTURE AND CONTENT

Completion of the doctoral program requires fulfillment of doctoral coursework in addition to submission and approval of a final dissertation. The dissertation should integrate the results of in-depth investigation into Asia Pacific issues and incorporate individual findings that outline strategic, policy-oriented and practical solutions to issues arising from current developments in the region. APU provides support for doctoral students conducting field research for their dissertations. Research supervision can be provided in areas such as diversity and integration, environment and development, international political economy and tourism development.

The Graduate School organizes the Research in Progress Seminars as an opportunity for doctoral students to observe the work of their peers and gain presentation experience and constructive feedback in regards to their research. These seminars are not only beneficial to those currently conducting their Ph.D. research, but also to those who wish to know more about the doctoral program and the research involved.



APU is involved in a range of research projects in accordance with the needs of international society and Japanese national research policy. APU provides a wide range of research support programs including financial subsidies, research skill development and various opportunities to meet with renowned researchers/experts. As the APU faculty are a group of international researchers, the fields of APU research stretch literally across borders.

RITSUMEIKAN CENTER FOR ASIA PACIFIC STUDIES (RCAPS)

RCAPS was established in 1996 with a mission to promote and foster research into the multi-faceted developments and challenges that face the Asia Pacific region in the 21st century. It provides valuable opportunities for research activities by sponsoring annual conferences and coordinating seminars throughout the year.

ASIA PACIFIC CONFERENCE (AP CONFERENCE)

The AP Conference is an international academic conference held once a year at APU. Researchers and students from around the world participate to present their research and academic perspectives. In 2015, about 250 participants from 20 countries gathered on the APU campus.

Master's Field Research Support Subsidy

Master's Students may receive up to 75,000 JPY a semester for travel expenses (transportation and accommodation fees) incurred while undertaking field research or presenting a paper at an academic conference.

Ph.D. Research Support Subsidy

Ph.D. students are entitled to this subsidy for various research activities such as participating in conferences, long field research, or publishing papers. They may receive up to 100,000 JPY a year.

The mission of APU's Graduate School of Management (GSM) is to cultivate creative, well-rounded professionals and leaders who will play a central role in resolving management issues at globalizing enterprises and other organizations by imparting advanced management skills, innovation, a good understanding of business ethics and a deep insight into globalization.

The Graduate School of Management has enjoyed an excellent reputation since it was established in 2003. It was given a 3 Palmes of Excellence rating (Excellent Business Schools with reinforcing international influence) in 2009 and was recognized as one of the top 20 business schools in the field of international management in East Asia in 2012-2013 by Eduniversal. APU has also served as a council member representing Japan in the Association of Asia Pacific Business Schools since 2012. In Japan, APU is continuously recognized by the Nikkei Shimbun as one of the top three educational institutions for employability of graduates.

The Graduate School of Management prepares you for managerial positions with advanced knowledge in international business and understanding of Japanese management practices. It is the only institution in the world where you can do so in an all-English curriculum within a culturally diverse learning environment.

MBA PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The MBA program at APU is conducted entirely in English in a culturally diverse learning environment. It offers a strong foundation in established management techniques, interactive classes with faculty and fellow students from around the world as well as opportunities for independent research and internships in the university's extended network with Japanese companies and organizations.

In addition to providing a standard curriculum for international business management, this program also offers students a chance to explore the Japanese style of management, which was built on the three pillars of long-lasting management, quality control and customer service excellence. Japanese management has emerged as an alternative management practice, serving as the new model for corporate management in the Asia Pacific region. The program not only opens up business opportunities in Japan—the world's third largest economy—but also various career options all over the world.

INTERNATIONAL ACCREDITATION

The Associate to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB - <http://AACSB.edu/>) is an internationally recognized accreditation organization of business schools. Only the world's leading business schools can receive accreditation, with approximately 600 schools having obtained accreditation so far. APU's undergraduate and graduate business schools have been working towards accreditation since 2008 and are currently at the final stage. The accreditation is expected to be finalized in September 2016.

COURSE STRUCTURE AND CONTENT

The GSM curriculum consists of four components: required subjects (analytical foundations, core business fundamentals and capstone courses); elective subjects (specialization courses); core-related subjects (courses related to the core business fundamentals and Japanese language courses) and management seminars.

Students need to complete forty-four academic credits of which twenty-two credits will be from required subjects, eight or more from specialization subjects and six credits from management seminars. In addition to fulfilling the credit requirements, students must also conduct a research project and complete an extended piece of writing in the form of a master's thesis, independent final report or internship-based case study. The research project must be approved by the university.

Students will also have the option to take basic Japanese language courses, credits from which will count towards program completion requirements. Japanese language knowledge has aided many of our GSM graduates in seeking employment at Japanese companies. No extra fees will be charged for earning more than forty-four credits.

STUDENT LIFE



FACILITIES

APU is a modern campus located approximately 400 meters above sea level with a spectacular view of the city, mountains and ocean. Our lecture halls, seminar rooms, classrooms and media rooms are equipped with the latest audiovisual and computer technology, enabling our students to take part in conferences and seminars happening in other parts of the world in real time. APU's library, part of the Ritsumeikan Network, allows students access to over 2.3 million books and publications. International newspapers, magazines, periodicals and video materials are available, and students are able to study together and carry out discussions in our group learning area, Pangaea.

Within the Faculty Office Building, graduate students have their own lounge, lockers and computer rooms. There are also small study rooms where students can bring their own computers and work on their papers and research. As faculty members have their offices in the same building, students can easily consult with their supervisors during office hours.

BEPPU CITY

APU is located in Beppu, a small city of 120,000 inhabitants located on the northeastern coast of Kyushu, the southernmost major island in the Japanese archipelago. The city is famous for its abundance of onsen (hot spring baths), and 140,000 tons of water gush daily from over 2000 sources, which is second only to Yellowstone National Park in the United States. Enclosed by beautiful mountains and the sparkling Beppu Bay, the city's historic backstreets and billowing steam clouds give it a peaceful old-town charm, and it remains a popular tourist destination for Japanese and international tourists alike. Beppu is also a mere ten minute train ride from Oita City, a vibrant city of 400,000, which was the venue for four matches of the 2002 FIFA® World Cup Korea/Japan™.

STUDENT LIFE

Student life at APU is an international experience like no other. The multicultural diversity of the campus provides a unique environment for students to improve their communication skills and expand their networks.

The Student Office at APU provides a range of services for students in terms of club activities, local exchange, homestay programs, accommodations and visa renewal. A health clinic and counseling rooms are also available should students encounter any problems or need advice.

Living Costs

The average monthly living expenses for students at APU vary depending on lifestyle, but usually range from 70,000 to 100,000 JPY including accommodation. Students can purchase reasonably priced meals at our cafeteria, which offers an array of Japanese and international cuisine.

Events on Campus

The campus becomes very lively during Multicultural Weeks. These events are organized to showcase the multitude of languages and cultures of our student body. During these weeks, students gather to celebrate their unique diversity through dance, film, music and various other types of performances. The university also holds a cultural festival annually, called Tenkusai, where students put each others' countries on show with food stalls, exhibitions, musical performances and cultural shows.

Accommodation

All graduate students are guaranteed a room in one of APU's student housing facilities, AP House 4, which will help them adapt to their new life in Japan and to concentrate on their studies. All rooms are equipped with basic facilities, including internet access. At AP House 4, experienced students selected as Resident Assistants (RAs) are available to provide help and support to residents. AP House 4 is located off-campus in downtown Beppu and it takes about thirty minutes to campus by bus.

If students wish to live in different off-campus housing or if they are coming with their family, they can find other affordable options in the form of private apartments and shared student housing. The cost of rent in Beppu is considerably lower than most other Japanese cities. Additionally, students can get assistance in locating and renting accommodations from Creotech, a university-affiliated company.

HOW TO APPLY

Students may enroll at APU in either April or September. However, not all programs begin from both semesters, so please be sure to confirm the enrollment periods before applying. Applications for each period are accepted at specific times throughout the year. Applications can be made by submitting a hard copy of required documents or via the APU online application system. Please note that there may be cases where the online application system cannot be used. Applicants for the doctoral program must contact the APU Admissions Office in advance to arrange for prescreening before submitting their formal application.

STUDENT VISAS

Applicants who do not possess Japanese nationality or who do not have a valid visa are required to obtain a student visa in order to study in Japan. APU applies for a Certificate of Eligibility to Japan's immigration authorities on behalf of admitted applicants. This certificate must then be used by the applicant to apply for a student visa.

ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

Master's degree applicants must have completed an undergraduate (bachelor's) degree or equivalent, while doctoral applicants must have a master's degree or equivalent and demonstrate adequate ability for independent research. All non-native speakers of English are required to provide test scores such as the TOEFL® test, TOEIC® test, IELTS or PTE Academic. The score requirements are as follows:

MBA applicants must have at least two years of full-time work experience or a satisfactory GMAT® or GRE® score. Details regarding general requirements and additional requirements for each program can be found in our Application Handbook and website.

Screening

Screening is mainly paper based, though in some cases an interview may be required. Application screening is conducted on the basis of documents submitted with the application form, with no written examination required. Applicants who reside in Japan are required to attend an interview at APU. More information can be found in the APU Admissions Handbook and website.

Ph.D. Applicants

All Ph.D. applicants are required to first find a supervisor who matches their research field and then undergo prescreening before they can officially apply. Information about our faculty and their research fields can be found on our website. The prescreening procedure is used to help find out if an applicant's research topic is suited to our program. For more information regarding prescreening, please refer to our Application Handbook or website. The application periods to submit documents for prescreening are shown below. Please note that prescreening documents submitted after these dates will not be accepted, and applicants will be unable to apply for that semester.

At APU, outstanding students have opportunities to fund their study under a range of different scholarships. There are several scholarships available, ranging from the APU Tuition Reduction Scholarship to full scholarships sponsored by various organizations such as the World Bank, Asian Development Bank and Japanese Government.

(1) APU TUITION REDUCTION SCHOLARSHIP

The APU Tuition Reduction Scholarship covers 30%, 50%, 65%, 80% or 100% of your tuition until graduation. It is available to both Japanese nationals and international students. This scholarship can be applied for through our regular application form at the time of application to APU's graduate programs. All applicants are eligible to apply for this scholarship. Scholarship results will be notified together with the screening results. Please note that the APU Tuition Reduction Scholarship will be cancelled if you receive any of the external scholarships from categories (2) and (4) listed below. After enrolling at APU, students also have opportunities to apply for additional scholarships.

Online application to the World Bank is also required at a later date. APU will recommend outstanding eligible candidates to the World Bank for this scholarship after receiving their documents. Final decisions regarding scholarship awards will be made by the World Bank. Results will be announced by the end of July 2017.

(3) THE RYOICHI SASAKAWA YOUNG LEADERS FELLOWSHIP FUND (SYLFF)

All eligible admitted applicants to APU will be automatically recommended for this scholarship. No additional application documents are required to apply.

About the Scholarship	This scholarship is for master's candidates admitted to APU, whose research relates to the following theme: "Issues and Opportunities in the Asia-Pacific Region: Rapid Transformation amid Accelerating Globalization". The research must also be related to the Syllff policy of taking a cross-disciplinary approach to tackle global issues and overcoming differences of nationality, language, religion and political systems.
Eligibility	Admitted master's applicants
Award	1,000,000 JPY/annually (100,000 JPY/ month for April and October, and 80,000 JPY/ month for the remaining 10 months) from October 2017 to September 2019 This scholarship will be revoked if the candidate takes a leave of absence.
Application Period	September 2017 Enrollment: Feb 6, 2017 (Mon) - Apr 5, 2017 (Wed) Not available for April 2017 enrollment.
Selection Process	APU will select outstanding eligible candidates and recommend them to Syllff for this scholarship.


